2 General Information about Studying at the PHDL

Studying at the PHDL is free of charge, there are no tuition fees whatsoever.

However, like all other Austrian students, you must pay a €25,20 student union fee when you arrive. This is not a study fee, it is a membership fee, that also partly pays for accident insurance coverage during classes. There are no study fees in Austria.

2.1 Academic Year

Winter Semester (WS):

Orientation Sessions for Incomings: last week of September

Classes: 1 October – 31 January exam weeks: February week 1

> Summer Semester (SoSe):

classes: 1 March – 31 June

Orientation Sessions for Incomings: last week of February

exam week: July week 1

2.2 Study programs at the PHDL

The PHDL offers the following study programs (QTS =Qualified Teacher Status):

Bachelor studies for

- Elementary Pedagogy (Elementary Teacher Education Bachelor)
- QTS Primary Level (Primary Teacher Education Bachelor)
- QTS Secondary Level (Secondary Teacher Education Bachelor)

Master Studies for

- QTS Primary Level (Primary Teacher Education Master)
- QTS Secondary Level (Secondary Teacher Education Master)

Incoming students must choose a **main study program** for administrative purposes. However, they are allowed to take courses from **other study programs**, as long as:

- They meet the required language level.
- There are available places in the selected courses.

In addition, Secondary Education Courses may be chosen by students of other study programs, as long as the courses are offered at the PHDL.

For language requirements please see chapter 3.2 (p.15 cont.)

2.2.1 Elementary Teacher Education Bachelor

Basic general education across the curriculum (age group of 2-6 yrs).

2.2.2 Primary Teacher Education Bachelor

Basic general education across the curriculum (age group of 6-10 yrs).

2.2.3 Secondary Teacher Education Bachelor

Specialist training in **2 subjects** (the age group of 10-18 yrs).

2.3 ECTS - European Credit Transfer System

ECTS credits show how much work a student needs to do to reach the learning goals of a course. The workload includes learning activities like attending lectures and seminars, writing essays and papers, doing projects, practical work, self-study or sitting for examinations. Each course is given a certain number of ECTS credits based on how much time and effort it usually takes to complete.

2.3.1 Understanding ECTS Credits

- 60 ECTS credits = full-time workload for one academic year
- Each semester lasts 15 weeks
- 1 ECTS credit = about 30 hours of work

2.3.2 ECTS Rounding for Incoming Students

Some courses in the PHDL curriculum are listed with 0.5 or 0.75 ECTS/1,5/2,5. To match the Erasmus standard, these are rounded up for incoming students: Example: 0.75 ECTS \rightarrow 1 ECTS for incoming students

2.4 Austrian Grading System

- 1 = excellent (outstanding performance)
- 2 = good (generally good, but with some errors)
- 3 = satisfactory (generally sound work with some substantial errors)
- 4 = sufficient (performance meets the minimum criteria)
- 5 = fail (< 50%; substantial improvement necessary; requirement of further work)

If your university is using a different grading system, it is your home university's responsibility to provide you with a conversion table.

2.5 Austrian Course Formats

Austrian course formats are important because they affect your attendance requirements for your various classes. You will get the 'Guidelines for Incoming Students' during the Orientation Sessions, which will deal with this issue at length.

2.6 Centre for International Relations - Areas of Responsibility

3 What to Do Before Mobility

3.1 Possible Durations of Mobility

- 1 semester
- 1 academic year
- Blended or short term mobilities: e.g. teaching placements (average 3 weeks), or BIPs (average 5 days).

Students can apply for **up to 12 months of mobility** during each study cycle (e.g., Bachelor, Master).

♣ Please note:

If you go on Erasmus **after graduation**, it counts as part of your **previous study cycle**. You must apply for your mobility before you graduate!

! Important:

Classes must be attended in person until the semester ends (unless explicitly defined as "E-Learning").

If you must go home before the end of the PHDL-semester for academic reasons, you must apply for this in your application survey before the start of your mobility (under "duration of mobility").

3.2 Language Requirements

For a preliminary self-assessment, please use:

- Elementary Teacher Education: German-speakers only, minimum B2 (as of 2025/26)
- Primary Teacher Education: non-German speakers welcome
- Secondary Teacher Education: non-German speakers welcome Secondary Education English courses require C1-English level.

Non-German speaking students must prove their B2-English Language proficiency level by submitting a recognized official language certificate, that includes reading, writing, listening, and speaking.

Accepted certificates:

- OLS-Test: Online Linguistic support, based on CEFRL, link provided by your home university after nomination
- Cambridge
- TOEFL
- TOEIC
- Aptis Esol

Important:

Simply ticking the box for B2 in the Learning Agreement does not constitute proof of your language competence. Also, we cannot accept confirmations by international coordinators.

Language of instruction at the PHDL: mostly German.

3.2.1 How Does Studying at the PHDL Work for Non-German Speaking Students?

Ideally, the language certificate is uploaded along with all other documents in their PHDL-application. If you do not have a recent test result ready for uploading, please continue the application survey and contact erasmus4incomings@ph-linz.at for more information.

Courses on these lists have been compiled according to the following principles:

- All teachers have agreed to support students who do not speak German.
- The courses are taught in English,
- or use a mix of German and English,
- or offer English reading materials
- and/or offer alternative assignments or exam methods.

Please note:

- These course suggestions are designed to make exchange mobility to Linz possible for students who do not speak German. Without German access to the complete course register would not make any sense.
- Most courses on these lists are either taught in **English** or are **practical teaching sessions**, where language is less critical.
- The **scientific content may be limited** to match the language skills of incoming students.

3.3 Nomination

Please contact the responsible person for outgoing students of your international office (="home coordinator") to find out about selection processes at your university.

Nomination Deadlines

WS/academic year: 15. April

SoSe: 31. October

Home coordinator nominates you by email to erasmus4incomings@ph-linz.at

Email nominations should contain:

- student's first name and surname (= family name)
- intended study program at the PHDL (s. 2.2)

- semester of arrival
- duration of stay
- student's email address

After nomination, the PHDL will send you and your home coordinator a nominationacknowledgment by email.

3.4 Application and Registration Procedure

Students basically need to apply twice:

- at the home university (in the pipeline of your university's mobility tool)
- 2. and at the PHDL (survey)

For the PHDL-application you will receive key data from the International Office in Linz as well as a link to the PHDL-online application-survey.

PHDL Application Deadlines:

WS/full academic year: 15. May

SoSe: 15. November > By link to survey

3.4.1 What to Prepare before Starting the Online-Application?

- a digital copy of your identity document (ID: both data pages!), jpeg. format
- a digital *headshot*, jpeg. format
- your language-test results (s. 3.2)
- the CEFRL Self-Assessment Grid for reference purposes (see 3.2.1)
- the email-address that should be used for forwarding the Transcript of Records

In case of technical difficulties regarding the survey, please contact thomas.schoeftner@phlinz.at.

We will process all survey data after the application deadline. Once processed, we will send you and your home coordinator a confirmation of acceptance (e.g. for visa purposes).



Please note:

If you should require a stamped letter of acceptance by post, please tell us in advance.

3.4.2 Additional Preparation for QTS Secondary Level 'Movement and Sports' and 'Arts'

Proof of physical ability required:

Please prepare digital proof of having passed aptitude tests or entrance examinations for your sports study program at home.



Important:

If you wish to do the primary level sports courses, you do not need an aptitude test!

3.4.3 Additional Preparation for QTS Secondary Level 'Music Education'

Proof of musical ability required:

Please submit by mail/wetransfer/or cloud:

- a video featuring you on your **major instrument** (only one!), which can also be the singing voice. The video must contain three stylistically different pieces of music/songs/arias with a total duration of approx. 30 minutes.
- To be submitted within the application deadline.

▲ Important:

If you wish to do the **primary level** music courses, you **do not need an aptitude test!**

3.5 Learning Agreement (LA/ELA/OLA)

International code for PHDL: A Linz04

PHDL Deadline for Learning Agreement: WS/full academic year: 15. August SoSe: 15. December

The **LA** is a legal document that defines the expected learning outcomes for the study period abroad. It also provides a guarantee of academic recognition from your home university.

The LA is a binding contract between the student and both partner institutions. It contains tables for:

- before the mobility
- during the mobility
- after the mobility (paper versions only)

3.5.1 ELA/OLA

The PHDL deals with the ELAs/OLAs through EWP.

Erasmus+ mobility students should find the OLA (ELA) in the pipeline of their mobility tool used by their home university (EWP).

In case of technical issues with the OLA, please contact your home coordinator.

How to Fill in the ELA/OLA?

- Please choose your courses from the **PHDL course lists** (see section 3.2).
- Fill in the **Before-Mobility section (Table A)** in coordination with your **home university** and sign the OLA.
- Your home university will complete **Table B** and approve the Learning Agreement.
- Please notify the PHDL coordinator, that the OLA is ready for signature, as we don't always receive an automatic request for signature.
- The PHDL will sign through EWP.

Please note:

After you upload all your information into the **ELA/OLA system**, it may take some time for your **home university coordinators** to sign it.

It can also take a few more days before it appears on the **PHDL side of the Erasmus Without Paper (EWP) system**.

3.5.2 LA - "paper version"

The PHDL accepts the "paper versions", only if ...

- your home university has insurmountable technical issues.
- your university is not connected to EWP.
- you are from a country outside the EU.

Erasmus-students: Please use the word.doc. provided by your home coordinator. **Students from outside the EU:** The PHDL coordinator will send you a LA-form to fill in.

How to Fill in the "Paper LA"?

- Fill in the tables marked with a red X, fill in the header of the document, sign your LA.
- Get your home coordinator's signature and scan the copy.
- Email the scan containing 2 signatures to gerda.reiter@ph-linz.at, who will add signature no. 3 and stamp the document.
- We will then return the scan containing all 3 signatures by email to all participants.

Scanned copies of signatures, electronic signatures or the electronic approval on the EWP-platform are accepted.

Important:

Providing **incorrect information**, such as your **language level**, is considered **fraud** under the legal terms of the Learning Agreement. This may lead to the **cancellation of your mobility** by the PHDL.

3.5.3 Choice of Courses

The PHDL is offering a mandatory course package laid on specifically for Incomings students, which will make up about half of your credits. The other half can be elected according to your wishes.

3.5.3.1 Mandatory Courses for Incoming Students

Depending on your choice of PPS, the mandatory courses will get you 15-20 ECTS credits.

3.5.3.2 Elective Courses for Incoming Students

Your **International Office at home** will advise you on which courses are **creditable**. Please also ask them how many **ECTS credits** you need to earn during your exchange.

Please note:

We can guarantee 30 manageable credits to non-German-speakers. You may do more courses, as long as you meet the language requirements and provided there are enough study places.

Please be aware, hat in a German speaking country like Austria, **the language barrier may limit course options**. A bit of **flexibility from your home university** can be helpful in these cases, automatic recognition would of course be ideal.

Please note:

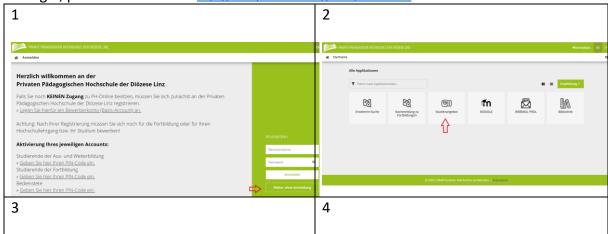
The academic level in QTS Secondary Education courses is generally higher and may require prior knowledge.

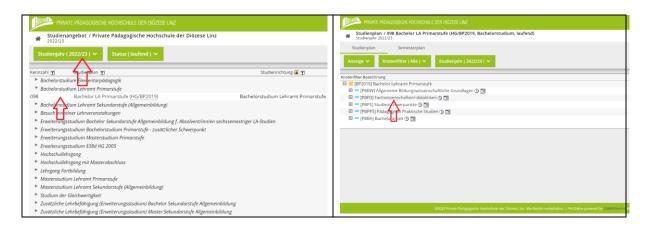
Students from the study programs Elementary and Primary Education may only choose Secondary Education Courses that are offered at the PHDL.

3.5.3.3 How to Find Course Lists for QTS Primary Education in the PHDL Online System

To view your current semester's course list in the **ph-online** system, follow the steps shown in the screenshots below. These will guide you through the process step-by-step.

To begin, please use this link: https://www.ph-online.ac.at/ph-linz/webnav.ini:





- After Log-in, make sure to enter the current academic year in step 3.
- Then navigate through the menu by clicking on any item that shows a plus sign (+) at the beginning.
- Keep clicking through each + until you reach an item with a minus sign (-). This is the actual course title.
- The course title will appear underlined in blue.
 Click on the title to open the course details.

You'll now see:

- The course description
- The course number
- The number of ECTS credits

To change the language, click the button in the top, right hand corner:



If the course description isn't available in English, please use an online translation tool.

3.5.3.4 How to Find Course Lists for QTS Secondary Level in the PHDL Online System

Courses for QTS Secondary Level are jointly offered by several universities in Upper Austria and Salzburg, which have formed a close cooperative network on a regional level, the 'Cluster Mitte'-Group. For a list of all our cluster partners see:

Important:

Look out for labels like "PLUS" or "JKU" in the course lists below — these indicate locations far from PHDL, such as in Salzburg.

You can avoid long and costly commute - There are plenty of secondary level courses available at the PHDL.

Your course selection may need to be adjusted after arrival. Timetable clashes can happen. Teachers may become unavailable due to illness or leave. Curriculum changes may affect course availability, especially during transition phases.

To handle those changes, the Erasmus Commission has included a section called "During **Mobility**" in your **Learning Agreement**.

There is also a 2-week trial period in Linz.

For further information on how to proceed in case of changes to your choice of courses, please see chapter 4.5.

3.6 Grants, Insurance and Visa

These matters are within the area of responsibility of your home institution. We are always happy to provide assistance in all matters of insurance and visa if required – just let us know!

Here are some additional tips.

3.6.1 Grants

If you need a **confirmation of accommodation** for your grant application or your visa, please contact the **student housing provider** of your choice directly.

3.6.2 Insurance

Please make sure your mandatory health insurance covers your entire mobility period, including travel time, and also covers all possible situations that may arise during your stay.

Part of your PHDL membership fee goes toward student accident and liability insurance (see Chapter 4.2). This covers all university-related activities, including USI sports courses and university excursions

Important:

This is **not** a health insurance. You will still need to arrange separate **health coverage** for your stay.

It is the student's responsibility to make adequate insurance arrangements for the duration of the entire mobility including travel times. Without adequate insurance, costs for medical treatment may be very high indeed!

EU-Citizens

To access the Austrian Public Health Service, you'll need your Electronic Health Insurance Card. Austria's public healthcare is generally very good.

Important:

EU health insurance usually **does not cover return transport** to your home country. To be safe, we recommend getting additional travel insurance. Check your credit card agreements some may already include travel insurance.

Non-EU-Citizens

Before your mobility, please check with your home insurance provider for any agreements between your country and Austria. You will likely need additional travel insurance.

Important:

Credit card insurance usually only covers travel-related issues, not general health insurance. Please check the details with your **bank** to be sure.

Austrian Health insurance:

For approximately € 70 you can get a students' general health insurance, e.g. with the Austrian Social Security System "Österreichische Gesundheitskasse" (short: ÖGK), amongst others.

3.6.3 Visa Regulations

You need to apply for your visa from your home country. Please make sure to organize your visa well in advance. Your home coordinator will help you with this.

Please note:

Some countries require a confirmation of accommodation for your visa application. Please make sure to book your room as soon as you're nominated and request a confirmation by your chosen student dormitory.

3.7 Accommodation

Students are kindly asked to organize their own accommodation. We will gladly provide information here.

3.7.1 Salesianum Students Residence

The Salesianum Students Residence is located directly on campus and is managed by:

A certain number of rooms are reserved for incoming students at the Salesianum. Reservation deadlines:

- before August (WS)
- before Christmas (SoSe).

After those deadlines, the rooms are passed on to other applicants. The PHDL cannot guarantee accommodation at the Salesianum.

▲ Important:

Please apply for your room directly with the dormitory management as soon as you've been nominated and remember to forward your email acknowledgement of nomination.

Even if you still wish to explore more options, we recommend making a reservation anyway!

Reservations can usually be cancelled with a refund of your deposit up to one month before your mobility starts.

You prefer to share a flat?

 Once the first group email is sent to all incoming students, you'll have the chance to connect with each other. Sometimes it's cheaper to share a flat with other students than to book individual accommodation.

Important:

Mind the distances to the PHDL!

3.7.3 General Information on Students Accommodation in Linz

For all matters of housing and for a confirmation of accommodation, please only contact the the dorm-managements directly.

Most student residences are **self-catering** (you prepare your own meals). Dormitory websites usually offer **English information**, including online application forms or registration systems.

Average Costs:

- Single room: €400–€500/month
- **Double room:** Around €350/month (per person)

🖈 Please note:

- Some student residences charge rent for a fixed 10-month period.
 - These are only suitable if you:
 - Plan to stay for the entire academic year, or
 - Can find a **replacement tenant** for the second half of your stay.
- Many student accommodations offer monthly rental contracts or even ½ months.

Please contact the dormitory directly and ask in advance about rental terms and cancellation policies.

Important:

Before arrival, please ask your dormitory whether they provide bedding, kitchen equipment, LAN cables or other essentials.

In some, you may need to organize your own, while other dorms offer equipment for a deposit. In either case, your buddies can help!

3.7.4 Short Term Accommodation in Linz

You cannot find a room at your student-dorm during the Orientation Week/for your BIP/your internship/your visiting family?

- Usually, students join up and book a flat on platforms like Airbnb or booking.com.

- Ask your buddy sometimes they let you stay in their rooms/flats for a couple of days.

3.8 Withdrawal from the Approved Mobility

Once your application is approved, you are committed to the mobility abroad. A withdrawal is only possible for serious reasons.

If you need to withdraw, please contact both your home and host institutions as soon as possible.

4 During Mobility

4.1 Arrival

Recommended time of arrival

- WS: mid-September, a few days BEFORE the first mandatory Orientation Session (September week 4).
- SoSe: mid-February, a few days BEFORE the first mandatory Orientation Session (February week 4).

This gives you time to settle in and get familiar with everything. If you arrive later, you'll have too many tasks to handle in too little time.

4.1.1 Pick-up-Service

You can arrange a pickup from Linz Blue Danube Airport or Linz Train Station.

This service is provided by our buddy volunteers. We recommend contacting our Buddy Coordinators in advance at buddy@ph-linz.at.

Please note:

Some buddies might still be on vacation when you arrive. The coordinators will do their best to find someone to pick you up and help you settle in.

4.1.2 Accommodation Key Pick-Up and Arrival Tips

Please make sure to arrange the handover of your keys with your dorm management, especially if you arrive at night or on a weekend. If needed, ask your buddy to pick up the key to your dorm/flat for you during working hours.

- You arrive on a weekend and your dorm has no bedding? The International Office has 3 sleeping bags you can borrow until you have managed to organize some. Please ask your buddy to pick up the sleeping bag during office hours.
- Your dorm doesn't provide any kitchen utensils? There is also a supply that you can borrow from for your stay.

4.1.3 Registration of Residence

When you move to Linz, Austria, you must register your address as your main residence within 3 days. This is required by law.

You can do this in person at the Citizens' Service Center (Bürger*innen-Service), Neues Rathaus, Hauptstraße 1 - 5, 4041 Linz

Your dorm-management will provide with the required form called "Meldezettel". Download form also from here: https://www.linz.at/serviceguide/viewchapter.php?chapter_id=122251#formulare

Documents Needed to Register Your Address in Linz

- Filled-out registration form (Meldezettel)
 Make sure all information is correct and complete.
- Passport or international ID

 Signature from the person who owns or rents out the place: If you are renting, your landlord must sign the form.

Registration Fee for Main Residence in Linz

Students now also have to pay a one-time fee when registering their main residence at the registration office.

- EU citizens (with national ID card): €21.00
- Non-EU students (from third countries): €42.00

Important:

Please keep the payment receipt together with your documents.

If you return to Linz later, you won't have to pay the fee again – just show the original payment receipt.

Tip:

You will go to the registration office with your buddies during the Orientation Sessions. They will help you with the registration process.

4.1.4 Tuberculosis Check for Non-EU Students

If you're from outside the EU, you must prove you don't have tuberculosis.

After registering your address in Austria, you will get a letter (in German) telling you when and where to go for a health check.

If you had a lung x-ray in the last 2 months, you can send this instead. If not, just go to the appointment.

Important:

Don't ignore the letter—even if it's in German! If you miss the check, the police might pick you up at your accommodation and take you there.

4.2 Registration at the PHDL

4.2.1 Enrolment at the University

PHDL will take care of your enrolment.

In July (WS) / January (SoSe), you'll get a link with a PIN to access our online system (PH-Online/pho).

- The PIN is valid for 2 weeks.
- Don't worry, if it has expired or if you have technical issues! We will help you log in and set up your account in **pho** on your **first day of Orientation Sessions**.
- QTS Secondary Education Students will receive links to the online systems of each of our partners from "Cluster Mitte". If you have chosen courses offered by some of our partners, you must open accounts there, too. Don't worry, if some of our partners send

their PIN later. We will support you in this, and it's ok to wait and deal with it during the Orientation Sessions!

Like all students in Austria, you'll need to pay the **student union fee of €25.20** when you arrive at PHDL. This payment will complete your registration, whereupon you will receive your **student ID card.**

4.2.2 Course Registration / Timetable

The ZIB-team will create the timetables for you and will introduce you to them during the Orientation Sessions.

Important:

Please do not register for course yourself, we will take care of this for you!

4.3 Certificate of Arrival

Arrival Documents for Your Grant

Most universities need proof that you've arrived in Austria. This is usually done with **one of the following forms**, which are provided by your home university.

Before you leave for Austria, check your university's website or mobility tool for the correct form. If you can't find it, contact your home coordinator.

- **Certificate of Arrival:** Upload this to your mobility tool to activate your grant. If your university doesn't use a digital tool, **email a scan** to your home coordinator.
- Certificate of Attendance: Fill in the arrival table. Upload this to your mobility tool to activate your grant. If your university doesn't use a digital tool, email a scan to your home coordinator.

(Keep this form safe—it must be signed again at the **end of your stay**.)

Please note:

Forms must be filled in completely by the student - all dates/university information/names of coordinators etc.

Please remember to bring the forms on your first day at the PHDL.

4.4 Orientation Sessions

Attendance at all orientation sessions is mandatory.

These sessions are organized as courses and include:

- Workshops
- Introductions
- Activities for exchange students, some of them together with buddies

You'll learn about the PHDL, studies at PHDL, student life and the city. In addition, it's a great chance to meet your buddies and get support as you settle in.

Orientation Sessions (OS) - Dates:

WS: September week 4 SoSe: February week 4

Please note:

A detailed program will be sent to you before you arrive. Please read it carefully to avoid asking questions that will already be answered during the Orientation Sessions.

4.5 Learning Agreement - Changes

4.5.1 Changing Courses After Arrival

In exceptional cases, you may **add or drop courses** within the **first 2 weeks** after arriving at PHDL.

However, any changes must be:

- Confirmed with Gerda Reiter before contacting your home university: Please email your requests to gerda.reiter@ph-linz.at and make sure to add all the necessary items of information (course no./course title/no. of credits)
- Approved by both coordinators (your home university and PHDL)

4.5.2 Implementing Changes in your ELA/OLA

Changes must be updated in your **ELA/OLA (Table A2)** within **5 weeks**. Some universities ask students to create a **new ELA** to replace the original one.

Please note:

For help with updating your ELA, please contact your **home coordinator**.

4.6 During Moblity

On day 1 of your Orientation Sessions, you will receive a document called "Guidelines for Incoming Exchange Students."

This guide includes semester-specific information, such as PHDL procedures, study and course-related matters as well as practical tips for life in Linz and Austria.

It's designed to help you settle in and navigate your exchange semester smoothly.

4.7 Extension of Mobility

Erasmus+ students have a 12-month limit per study cycle.

This includes all time abroad, even if you didn't receive an EU grant (e.g. zero-grant or short-term mobility).

Extensions are possible, if:

- You have not used up the 12 months of your study cycle.
- The additional period follows immediately after the current one.
- There is **no time-gap** between the two periods. (**Holidays and university closures** do not count as gaps.)

4.6.1 How to apply for an extension?

Please first contact Gerda to find out about available vacancies before applying at home.

If your extension is within the same academic year, you usually simply need to submit a new ELA/OLA with the courses for the extension semster.

Some universities treat extensions as two separate mobilities and may ask you

- to complete the current mobility.
- apply for a new one during your mobility. Your 2nd mobility will starting immediately after the first one, or after the summer break.

Extension Deadlines:

- Some universities have their own deadlines please make sure to find out!
- According to Erasmus-regulations, the LA form must be submitted at least **4 weeks before the** intended start of the extension

5 How to End Mobility

5.1 Confirmation of Attendance

Most universities **require a Certificate of Attendance to mark the end of mobility**. This form is usually provided by the home university. It might be the same one you used when you arrived, or a different one — **please check at home** to be sure.

What You Need to Do:

- Visit the PHDL International Office in person to deregister.
- Bring the form from your home university ready for PHDL to sign only.
- **Timing**: The certificate **can only be signed within 5 days before** your last study-related activity in Linz.

▲ Important for Erasmus+ Students:

Make sure the **mobility dates on your certificate match your grant agreement**. A difference of more than 5 days could mean you'll have to repay part of your Erasmus+ grant.

★ Please note:

Forms must be filled in completely by the student - all dates/university information/names of coordinators etc.

5.2 Transcript of Records (ToR)

Your **Transcript of Records** includes all the courses, grades, and ECTS credits you completed during your exchange.

The PHDL coordinator will send your signed and stamped ToR to the email address you provided in your application.

ToR – Deadlines:

Teachers may take up to 5 weeks after the end of the term to enter grades.

Please Note:

To avoid delays:

- Submit all assignments before classes end (WS: end of January / SoSe: end of June).
- Late submissions of assignments may delay your ToR, and the PHDL is not responsible for such delays.
- Remember to inform Gerda about courses that you may have dropped during your stay.

5.3 Recognition of Learning Outcomes

important:

The PHDL may refuse to recognize your academic achievements if certain requirements are not met. This can happen if:

- You take courses that are **not approved** in your Learning Agreement.
- You **don't complete** the courses listed in the Agreement.
- You have irregular attendance.
- You don't meet the required workload.

To ensure your learning outcomes are recognized, always follow your Learning Agreement and meet all course requirements.

What Happens If You Fail a Course?

Most universities do not award credits for failed courses, and for many students, it's not beneficial to include failed courses in their Transcript of Records (ToR). That's why failed courses are usually not included in your ToR.

If you want a failed course to appear in your ToR, please contact Gerda Reiter, and we'll make sure it's added.

What If My Home University Refuses to Recognize My Courses?

If a course is listed in your Erasmus+ Learning Agreement (ELA/OLA), you have a legally binding guarantee of recognition. This means:

- Your home university must recognize the course and its credits.
- Even if staff or coordinators change, they cannot "change their mind" about credit transfer.

Important:

Always keep a hard copy of your signed Learning Agreement as proof.

5.4 Deregistration of Residence

When your exchange period ends, you must deregister your residence at the local registry office no earlier than 3 days before your departure. (see section 4.1.3).

Important:

This is a legal requirement in Austria. Failing to deregister is against the law can cause serious problems if you try to re-enter Austria in the future.

5.5 Return Equipment

Please remember to return any kitchen utensils, sleeping bags, or (cleaned ②) hiking boots to the International Office.

If you want to pass on equipment to your successor:

- For large items (like bedding), please contact your dorm management first.
- Small items can be dropped off at the International Office.

6 Living in Linz

Your buddies are your first port of call in all matters of living in Linz.

7 FAQs

Why do other exchange students use different forms than I do?

There are some standardized forms issued by the European Commission. However, in the process of digitisation each sending institution may have come up with additional forms for their administrative procedures that they wish to continue with.

When can I create my timetable?

Timeslots for courses are susceptible to last-minute changes. Which is why we gladly create the schedules for you. You will receive your timetables during the Orientations Sessions.

Will I need to bring bedding for my room at the students' hostel?

Please ask directly at the reception of your accommodation - not all hostels provide bedding (pillow/duvet and sheets). S. chapter 4.1.2.

It might prove useful to contact former exchange students from your home university. Maybe you can even take over/pass on some stuff from/to the next exchange students from your university. Communication may save you effort and money ②.

Can I borrow musical instruments at the PHDL?

All PHDL-music rooms are equipped with *pianos and guitars*.

In addition, there is 1 organ, an accordion, percussion, and Orff-instruments. These must however remain in the music rooms and are for use within the PHDL only.

If you are interested in getting tuition on any other instruments as the ones mentioned above, it is your own responsibility to organize your instrument for the duration of your stay in Linz.

You must have a **standard-EU credit card** (mastercard, visa, ...) for hiring instruments.

What kind of clothing will I need in the winter semester?

Austria has a moderate climate, but in winter, temperatures can drop below freezing point (sometimes as low as -10°C). So, make sure to bring adequate winter clothing!

You'll Need:

- A Warm winter coat/jacket
- Winter boots with thick soles
- Warm jumpers
- Woolly hat and gloves
- Insulated clothing for snowy days

Avoid thin fabrics like viscose (unless padded) – they won't protect you from the cold! Best prepare to wear multiple layers to stay warm and adjust easily to indoor/outdoor temperatures.

What Equipment Do You Need for Hiking in Austria?

Austria offers beautiful hiking trails, but safety and preparation are key. Good hiking boots are essential, (preferably ankle-high for support) with a rough sole for grip on uneven terrain.

If you can't bring hiking boots due to luggage limits, contact the PHDL International Office when you arrive. The International Office has a few pairs on loan. We can also advise you on local shops or rental options for affordable gear.
